Tasks start at 9.30am. Most end at about 4.30pm. Everyone welcome and your help will be valued for whatever time you can spare. However. if vou are between 16 and 18 years old your parent or guardian must sign a consent form - please contact the HCV Secretary. Children under 16 must be accompanied by an adult who must be responsible for them previous at all times. No experience is necessary. Instruction in techniques and safe working practice will be given.

WHAT TO BRING

You'll need a packed lunch and a mug, strong footwear (work boots, walking boots, or wellies for wet tasks), old warm clothes, and waterproofs. Sun protection is advisable (even in winter). We provide tools and protective gear, as well as tea and coffee.

Insurance cover is arranged for the group on task. An up-to-date anti-Tetanus injection is strongly advised for most outdoor activities. If you think you may not be covered on this other or other health issues, you are advised to consult a health professional.

Wildlife & Country Crafts Fair 2007

In May Parndon Wood Nature Reserve hosted its annual wildlife and country crafts fair. This year's event was well attended and visitors were treated to a range of stalls and displays.



Harlow Conservation Volunteers demonstrated their skills by completing a charcoal burn using wood from the nature reserve produced during coppicing operations during the previous winter. The charcoal is then bagged up and sold, with all proceeds going to Harlow Conservation Volunteers to support ongoing projects within Harlow. The local production of charcoal using these methods is completely organic and is a valuable demonstration of historic woodland management practices.

Bags of charcoal for the barbecue cost £3 per bag and are on sale at Harlow Town Show in September and throughout the year from Parndon Wood Nature Reserve.

Harlow Marshes Local Nature Reserve Improvements

During the Summer of 2007 HCV and Harlow District Council have been undertaking a number projects to improve the condition of Harlow Marshes LNR, led by HCV member and project coordinator Colin Lincoln. Many of the activities have taken place within Marshgate Spring, a small area of ancient bluebell woodland and marsh to the north of Edinburgh Way, adjacent to the Queensgate retail area. The area has suffered from various problems in the past, including dumped shopping trolleys, litter and trespassing motorbikes, which have all led to a decline in the condition of this





unique site in Harlow. In addition, public access has been restricted in the past during the wetter months when the tracks and paths become unpassable. The drainage ditches which feed the main marshes area to the north have also become silted and blocked. A post and rail fence and stile have been erected to protect the boundary of the site. A boardwalk has been installed to provide year round access for the public to view the important bird, plant and animal life present on the site. Funding

from the Essex Biodiversity Project has also financed a contractor to clear the ditches to ease the water flow through the site. The improvement in the quality of the site has been dramatic, with visitors now able to enjoy the site to the full. Further tasks to improve and maintain Harlow Marshes LNR are scheduled for the Autumn/Winter of 2007, including willow and hazel coppicing and reed cutting (see programme for further details).

Cutting and clearing of marsh


Task leader: Linda

Meet in the Toys 'R' Us car park at the shop front, Edinburgh Way. Grid Ref. TL 454 114.





Sunday 28th October Stewards School, Harlow Meadow cutting and scrumping



Learn the theory and methods that are used in the traditional management technique of coppicing at East End wood.







bashing




Sunday 27th January: East End Wood Coppicing
